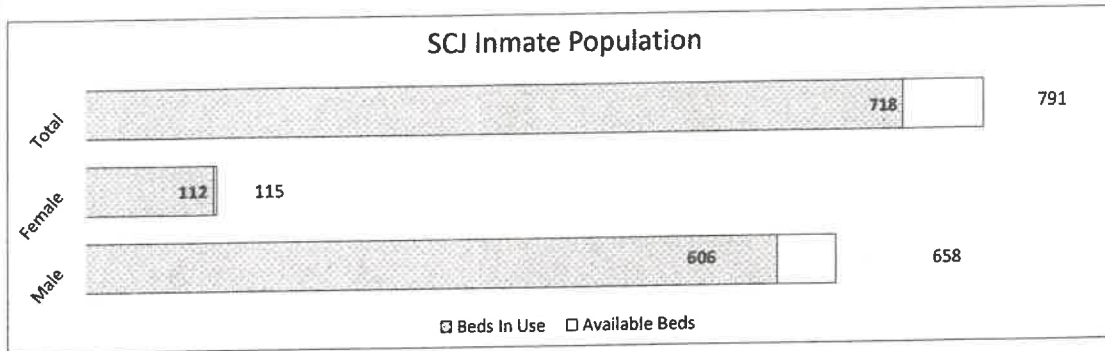

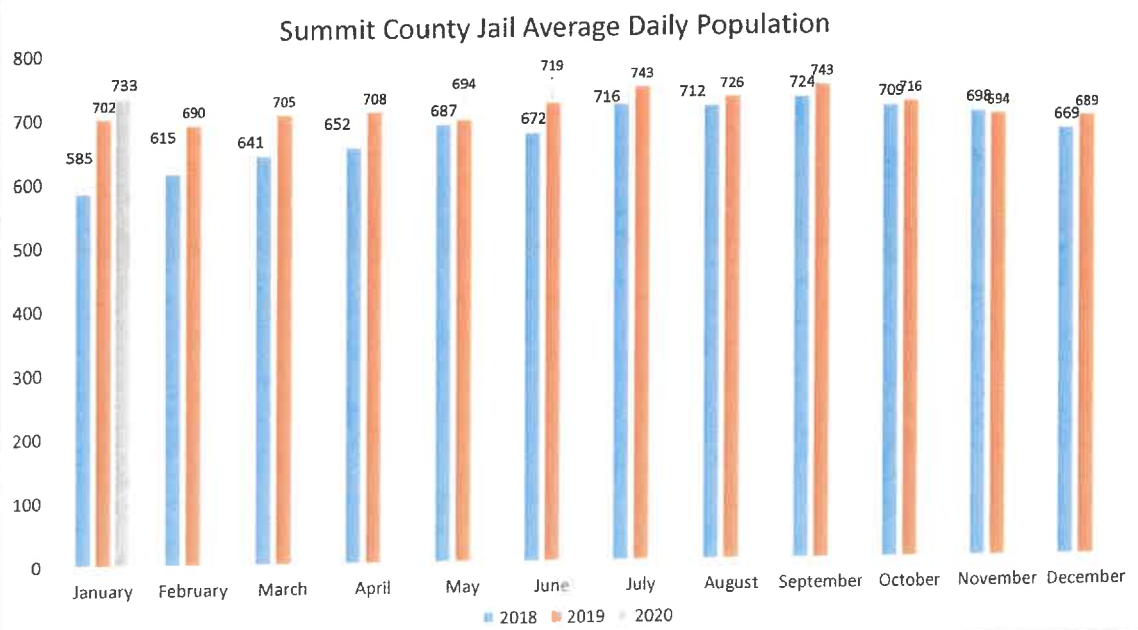

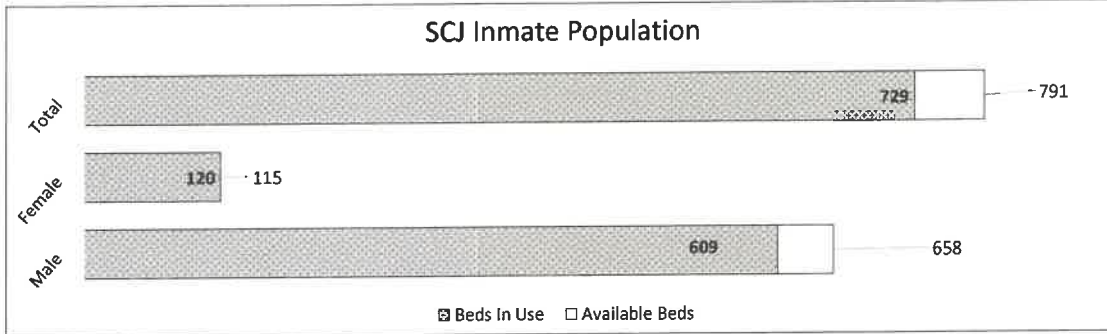

Summit County Jail Inmate Population and Statistics Thursday, January 23, 2020



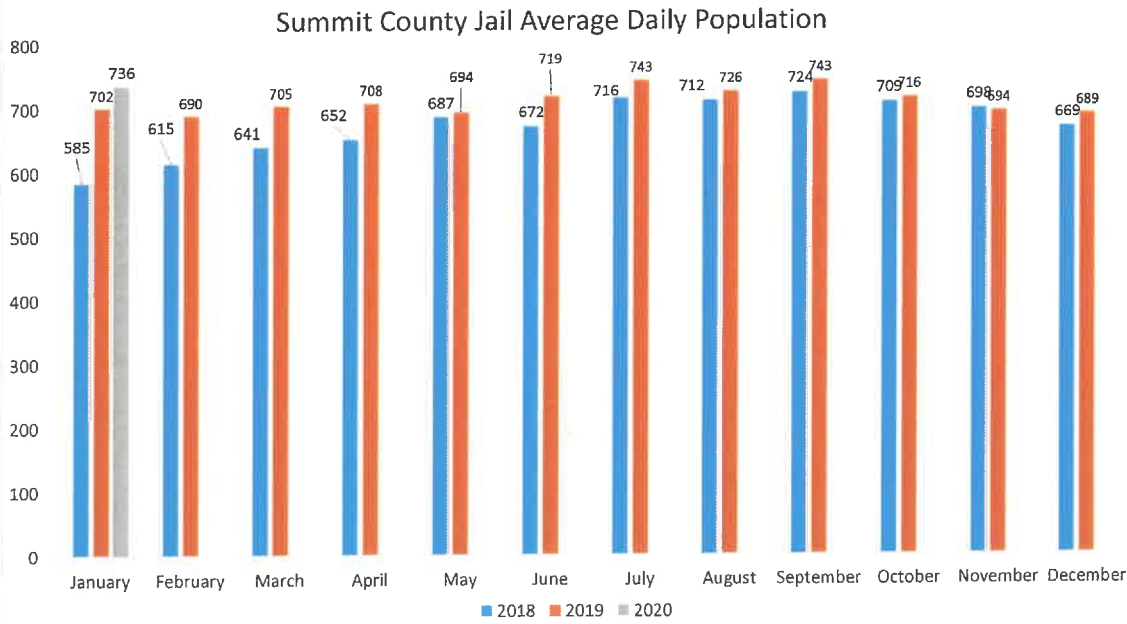

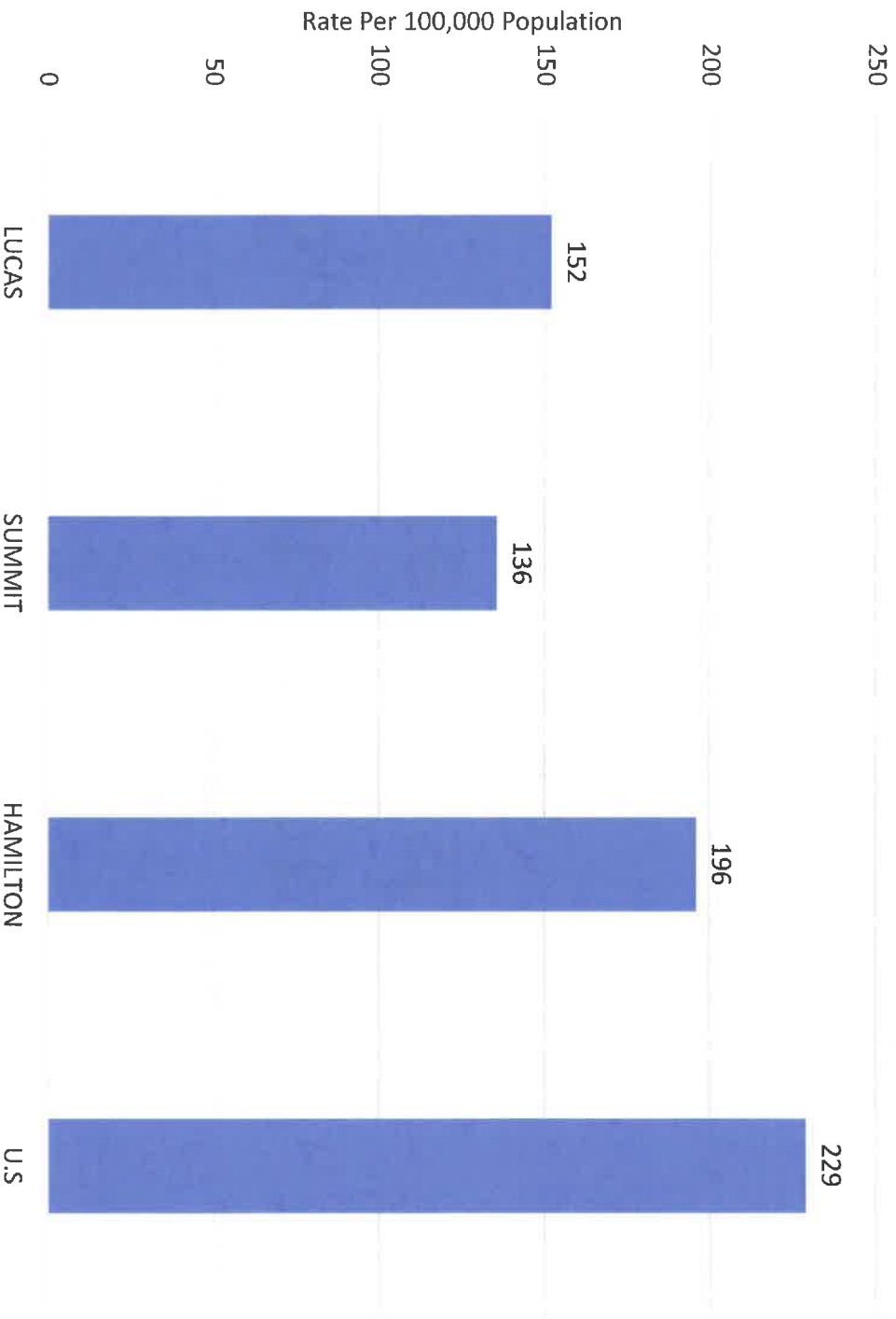

This meeting of the Summit County Criminal Justice Advisory Board was called to order by Ilene Shapiro on Tuesday, August 13, 2019 at 12:05 p.m. in the Domestic Relations Ceremonial Court Room, 209 S High Street, Akron Ohio 44308.

II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES – April 23, 2019

Jerry Craig motioned for the approval of the April 23, 2019 minutes, with Jim Lawrence as the second. The motion carried unanimously by voice vote.

III. OLD BUSINESS

- Oriana House

Jim Lawrence is currently sitting on a bail reform taskforce work group with the Supreme Court. The proposal would be to start using risk assessments for misdemeanor courts. Summit County bails bondsmen are not as prevalent in Summit County as other counties. The Supreme Court will set up their own default schedule to use. Lori Pesci provided an attachment with their recommendations. [attachment included]

- Opiate Trial

Greta Johnson stated they are moving forward with the October 21st trial date. The County has recently filed to be a class action lawsuit which is a first of its kind. The Judge is requiring that the defendant size be reduced to 6-8. The Ohio Attorney General has filed an objection and believes the state should receive the money. Summit County and Cuyahoga County remain the bellwether case.

- Drug Testing

Gert Wilms stated she received a letter from the Attorney General regarding THC testing. There currently is nowhere in Ohio to get testing at the misdemeanor level.

V. NEW BUSINESS

Executive Shapiro introduced Senator Sykes [D, 28th Dist] to discuss SB 3. HB 1 is the companion piece to SB 3 which deals with the modifying and sealing of records and has already passed the house, introduced in the senate, but has not been assigned to a committee. Senator Sykes will email a copy of the bill with a brief explanation to Lori Pesci to distribute to the CJAB Committee.

SB 3 changes the threshold of criminal prosecution. There has to be more volume of drugs for high-level offenses. 4th & 5th degree felony drug offenses will essentially be reduced to misdemeanors. They will reclassify the drug charges and they will be eligible for the sealing process. It would also remove the filing fee if you commit

to have treatment. The Judge can put in abeyance certain charges if the defendant waves the right to a speedy trial and goes for treatment. If they complete the program, the charge will be dismissed.

Judge Joy Oldfield stated if they stay in the felony court system, they will receive more help. Judge Fish stated the 4th & 5th degree docket will fall on the Municipal Courts and will increase the workload for these judges.

Greta Johnson stated she feels this group wants to make sure the Drug Court continues to receive the resources and clients and it needs to help with recovery. Petitioning the court for involuntarily committing people is an option. This allows for the person to complete a drug program. If these changes go into effect, they will be retroactive. Greta asked that everyone review at the 40 page summary.

Judge Joy Oldfield asked about effective date concerning CBCF. Senator Sykes stated the general effective date would be in 90 days.

Judge Joy Oldfield stated the Common Pleas Judges Association has sent in opposition to SB 3. Judge Jody Lubbers is the contact.

Judge Fish is the trustee for the Municipal Court. He stated as such, they are opposed to the downstream affect. The felonies will be the responsibility of the local law directors. There presently is not enough staff to put this in effect.

Senator Sykes stated this group has raised a lot of practical considerations that should be considered particularly when we want to make the system more just and stated our input, could figure out how best to do it. Senator Sykes stated the benefit of the statute is that it can be changed. There have been a dozen amendments to this already. They are looking for ways to improve.

John Trunk from Summit County DD stated he was pleased with the budget bill that had state funded direct care funding that helped with the budgeting process. Senator Sykes stated that budget had very strong support, mainly because the economy is better.
