## Project Background, Objectives, and Drivers

#### **Project Objectives**

- Adequately fund costs, while minimizing rates.
- Fair, equitable, and affordable rates.
- Sustainable and affordable 5-year plan.
- Recommend communication methods

#### **Project Drivers**

- Rising cost of wastewater treatment (Akron and NEORSD).
- Pump station and force main replacements.
- Sewer system rehabilitation and replacement.
- Wastewater treatment plant improvements and replacement work.

### **Look Back: Rising Costs for DSSS**

#### **Annual Expenditures**



Category of Cost	Approx. Increase in Annual Cost from 2011 to 2021*
DSSS Operating	22%
DSSS Capital	0%
Other Treatment	107%

#### **Annual Expenditures and Revenue**

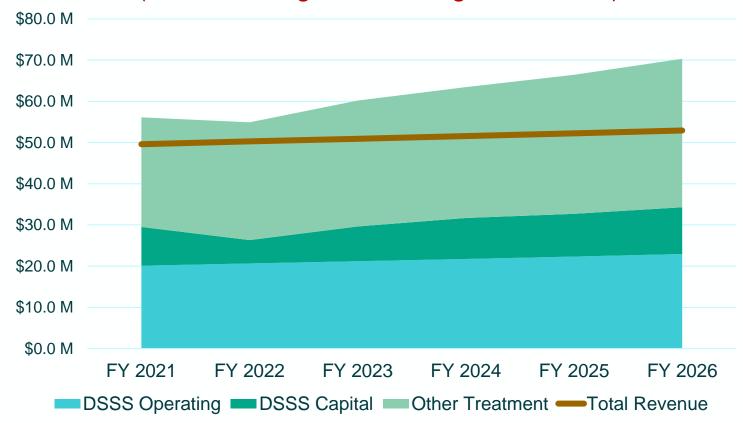


Category of Cost	Increase in rates from 2011 to 2021*

### Forecast: Future Rate Adjustments are Needed

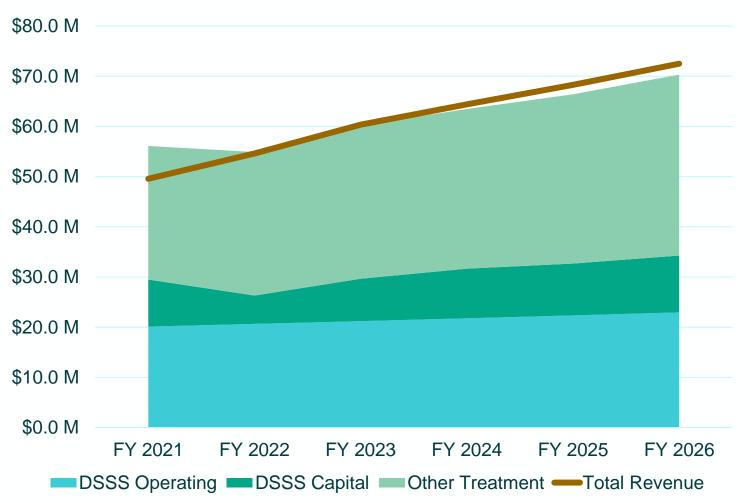
Projected Expenditures and Revenue (with no changes to existing sewer rates)

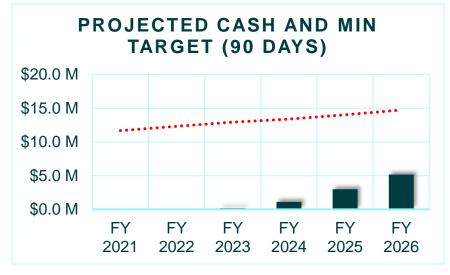


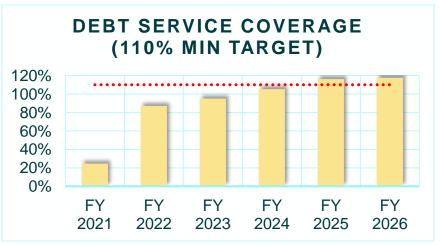
Specifically, the rate adjustments are needed to:

- Account for economic pressure applied by rising 3<sup>rd</sup> party treatment costs and EPA mandates.
- Fund operating expenses, system maintenance and growth.
- Replenish cash and build reserves to reasonable levels.

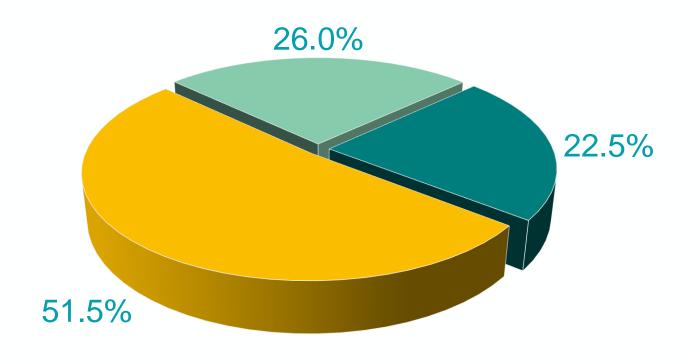
## Forecast: Financial Forecast with Rate Adjustments

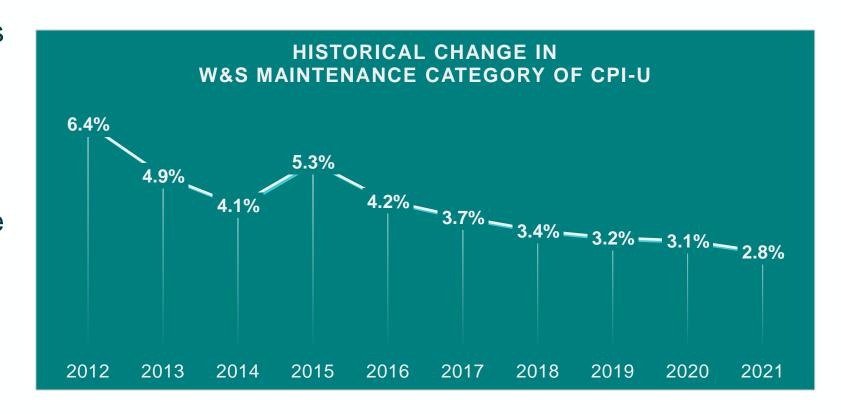

## Inflationary Increases to Rates for FY 2027 - 2031

- Propose inflationary increases to sewer rates in FY 2027 to 2031, based on W&S Maintenance Index.
- This is a component of CPI and reflects an estimate of the annual change in the cost of water / sewer service.
- Historical change of about 4.0% per year.

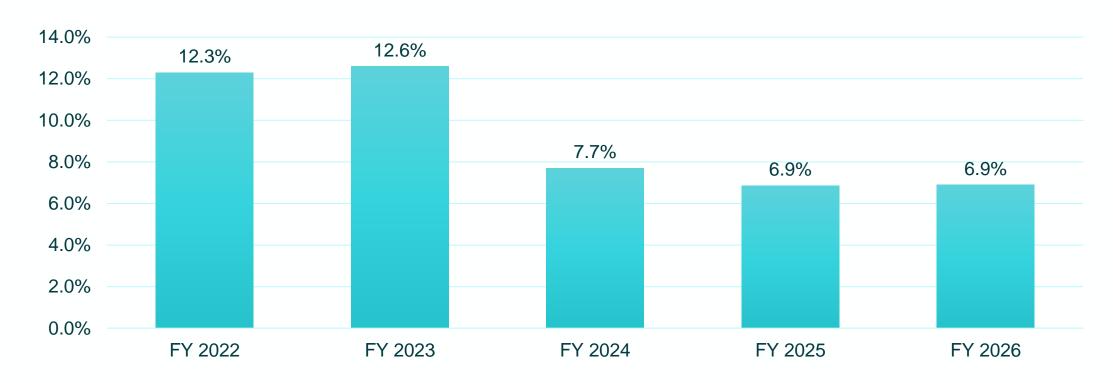

- Rate revenues include:
  - Billing Charges, Metered User Rates, Unmetered Flat-Rates, and the Sewer Maintenance Fee

### **Updated Tap-In Fees**

- Assessed pursuant to Section 923.05 of the County's municipal code.
- Helps to more equitably recover upfront cost of backbone infrastructure.
- Paid by new customers based on their unique capacity demands.

\*Assumes a 5/8-inch meter and 6.1 CCF of billable flows per month.



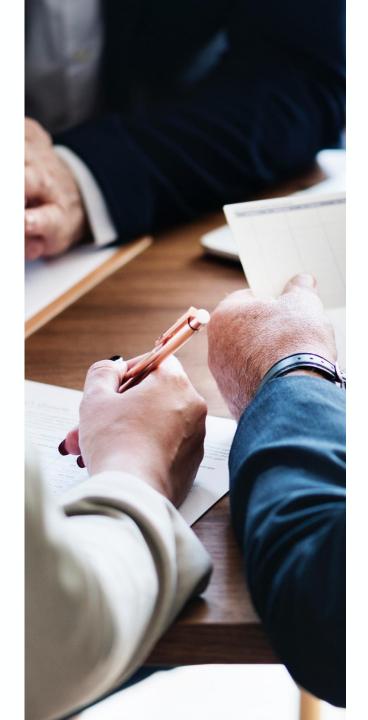

## **Affordability Programs and Assistance**

- Maintain Summit County's Discount Program
  - Ten percent (10%) reduction for eligible customers.
  - An additional twenty-five percent (25%) for eligible flat-rate customers (for FY 22 and FY 23, changing to 10% thereafter).
- Summer Sprinkling Program ten percent (10%) discount for all residential customers (June, July, August).
- Summit County Cares' Emergency Rental Assistance Program.
